CAREER AWARENESS WORKSHOP AT PUNE

A Career Awareness Workshop was conducted in Pune with faculty support from Enable India Bangalore (EIB) on the 13th and the 14th Jan at the premises of S P College, Pune. Around 35 Visually Impaired students from different colleges in Pune participated in this event.

The program aimed at enabling VI students gain access to quality education with emphasis on IT and other enabling technologies, generating aspirations among them for careers in the private sector and setting their minds on a journey of picking up and utilizing skills and attitudes to meet the corporate sector expectations.

While the first day was spent in introductions and self-analysis, the highlights of the day were the "Role-Play" and the "Team Building" exercises that brought out the need for taking efforts to achieve one's aims and goals.

The second day was spent on subjects like Skill development, tools for self-learning, opportunities and careers for persons with vision impairment discussing business cases and company expectations. The programme ended with an impressive address on HR Skills and personality development by Ms. Vasundhara Kelkar

Job Oriented Skills for the Visually Impaired

Having helped around 2500 students (1700 in the academic year 2017-18 alone), we in HTBF are making serious efforts to get jobs for our VI students. While quite a few of them get jobs in low level positions and a lucky few in good positions like Banks etc., our concern is to get a well –focused program of providing them with organized and professional training in job related skills and enable them to take up positions in the private sector like IT and service industries where they can sit and work along with their sighted counterparts.

Training the VI, or for that matter any Person with Disability, involves much more than teaching computers and language proficiency. It involves talking to the VI in boosting their morale, gettingthem to realise that they too "can do" things that a sighted person does and all that is required is an effort and quite a sustained one. Once the students become aware of their own potential, an awareness program may need to be given with details of the variety of jobs available to the VI community and the basic requirement of academic as well as skills required for taking up such jobs. The student will then be required to choose a job under the guidance of a counsellor and prepare himself to get an intensive training for the skills required. The skills training may last, depending upon the nature of job and the required skills set, from a couple of weeks to a few months.

Besides the training of the student, a bigger challenge is his acceptability among the prospective peers with whom he will be working. To achieve this, sensitising the peer level and the immediate supervisory workforce acquires a lot of significance. This is being done very successfully by a good number of NGO organisations with close links with the prospective employers.

We, in HTBF, are organising awareness workshops with the help of such NGOs.
