#### An occasion for celebration!

We are delighted to announce that 12 Visually-impaired candidates have been hired by Sutherland, thanks to the persistent and laudable efforts of the HTBF teams at Chennai and Coimbatore, led by our Trustee, Mr. Nataraj Sankaran. Among the twelve, three are from our current EMET (Education, Mobility and Employment Training) batch from Presidency College, nine from other sources (we facilitated the whole interview process, accommodated them in Chennai for short term training before their final interview and paid for all their expenses too).

They will get trained for the non-voice process and will go through various types of training before being fully absorbed.

In the first week of April 2023, we placed one of our EMET trainers, Bilal, at Sutherland and he will be providing them on-the-job assistance. In total, we have so far placed 26 visually-impaired persons at Sutherland this year including our two senior trainers Bilal and Vikas. Bilal and Vikas will not only train the new candidates, but also help Sutherland and their clients improve the accessibility of their software to the visually-impaired.

While quite a few of our students are getting placed at various banks and corporates, this is the single biggest batch of candidates trained with a well-structured need-based training program and employed at one single corporate.

In all, 56 of HTBF's graduates trained through the EMET Programme have got jobs thus far, in different sectors and companies.

We thank Sutherland for their help and active cooperation in the training and absorption of these candidates and for their interest in increased inclusion in their company.

We actively seek the support of other such well-meaning Corporates in providing jobs to the visually-impaired. Let's take inclusion a step further, NOW!

#### Smart Vision Glasses (SVG) make inroads into several cities



In our constant endeavour to elevate the status of the Visually Impaired students, HTBF has already adopted technology in teaching the V I Students through the EMET program.

As a next step closer to technology, we have identified an assistive device which would turn the visual capacity of a V I from darkness to a more interactive, interesting and an innovative world and Smart Vision Glass Project is being launched.

Objectives of the project:

1. To enable the blind and visually impaired to live a life of independence and dignity by helping them gain access to a world class AI - powered assistive device.

Salient features of the device:

2. To jointly support a promising technology that in the future can significantly transform the lives of people with vision impairment.

- Things around you- All kinds of objects in front of the device are identified
- Reading Assistance- Can read books, road signs and newspapers and manuscripts.
- Walking Assistance It recognizes objects in its view such as vehicles, obstacles, traffic signals, zebra crossings, furniture.
- Facial recognition Identifies people, approximate age, expressions and recognizes people if a name is attached.
- Can talk in Indian regional languages such as Hindi, Tamil and Telugu
- Give directions to a destination when asked, using GPS.

To begin with 400 devices will be donated by Cognizant Foundation and Vision Aid India (200 each).

We are delighted to announce that we have successfully enabled better vision to several of our visually-impaired beneficiaries through the distribution of 115 Smart Vision Glasses from April to June 2023 in Coimbatore, Nagpur, Bangalore, Thanjavur, Trichy, and Chennai.

A further 145 beneficiaries from Ahmedabad, Indore, and Delhi will receive these Smart Vision Glasses between July and August 2023. We are also happy to say that these glasses have been received very well so far, although their usage requires familiarity and practice. We are in the process of collecting feedback from users.

**Pavan** is a HTBF beneficiary from the Nagpur region. He started to use SVG in his daily life. He gave feedback about SVG that it's a very nice assistive technology. "It helps us to read the text, books, and newspapers, he so much likes the emergency trigger options. Walking assistance needs improvement. Hope in the future we'll have this device in an upgraded version and it will help us in dayto-day life", says Pavan.

Feedback from **Sonam Thakre**, 2nd year student, Ambedkar College, Nagpur:

"Thank you, Sir and HTBF for working for us for so many years. Thank you for providing us Smart Vision Glasses which is very useful. We, I especially feel the training is useful and we will surely use what we have learnt. I will tell my juniors - the 1st year students that they must attend these courses, never miss them.

Thanks again to the foundation for the laptops as well as the glasses. During the EMET training they also told us about 3 or 4 common attitudes, they run tests for us, explain and clarify our doubts clearly.

We feel there's a connection between us and HTBF. Thanks to HTBF, our career life will be super. Now we should do smart work more than hard work.

I have a suggestion - wonder if you think it's appropriate or not - it would be nice if you can run a program for all the groups together so they can meet each other - like Nagpur ones can meet Indore ones etc. Thank you once again."

# EMET Annual Meet 2023

The annual meeting of the Help the Blind Foundation's EMET team was held from May 15 to May 18 at School of Ancient Wisdom, Bangalore. Ms. Pooja, the Project Officer-Skill Development, welcomed the participants. In his introductory remarks, Mr. Nataraj Sankaran, Trustee, outlined the purpose of the annual meeting. The sessions and events on each of the four consecutive days

were meticulously planned and well organized to help the project team acquire new knowledge and better prepare themselves to serve on the ground.

The technical team from SHG Technologies, Bangalore helped run training sessions to make sure that all visually-impaired trainers had the technical know-how they needed and to encourage their development as adept SVG users.

With facts on progress, issues, and future plans, regional presentations covering the period from August 2022 to April 2023 were made. A group comprising trustees and volunteers who evaluated the information each trainer had delivered, gave the Indore region the honour for the outstanding presentation. The SDF (Student Development Forum), GLC (Guest Lecture Committee), and Assessment & Report Committee members each gave an overview of the activities of their respective committees in addition to zonal presentations. Former HTBF trainer Mr. Vikas did a fantastic job of describing how he switched from HTBF to Sutherland and the successes he has made there as a Customer Support Associate.

In an attempt to drive teams to engage, celebrate, and enhance cross cultural connections, a cultural programme was also set up on the first day's evening.

Through the presentation of the project officer for Planning and Fund management, specifics regarding donors, the budget approved to execute the EMET Programme, and a few suggestions for future interventions were discussed. The Team members were acknowledged for their contributions through accolades such as Star Trainers, All-Rounder, Best English and Computer Trainers, Pillar of HTBF, Best Budding Trainers, and Best Supporting Staff.

Mr. Nataraj Sankaran, Trustee, reiterated the organization's vision and goals, the value of teamwork, and the significance of creating a culture of team work. He also inspired the team by discussing "*The 7 Habits of Highly Effective People*", admirably creating a mental picture of a winwin scenario, SMART Goals and the steps the team needed to take, with a focus on priorities and

#### Did you know?

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People who are visually-impaired can, and do use computers, phones, and other electronic devices just as much as sighted people. They just have different ways of accessing these devices - they use what's called assistive technology, including screen readers, refreshable braille displays, and digital screen magnification to interact with high-tech products.

We have been trying to procure laptops for our visually-impaired beneficiaries across India. Imagine our happiness when this effort was fulfilled by the magnanimity of the KCET (Kishinchand Chellaram Educational Trust), who donated 50 laptops in one go!

The laptops were distributed to visually-impaired students at Wadia College and Modern College, Pune. A big thanks to Kishinchand Chellaram Educational Trust (KCET), represented by Dr. Deore, for their generous and most thoughtful donation.
